The materials I have used are brass, bronze, card, copper, cotton, feathers, flax, hibiscus, ink, iron, lead, leather, paper, paint, patina, schist, sinnet, silk, wood and wool.


My drawings reflect my years of sketching and thinking about ethnographic objects in museums around the world.

My outdoor bronzes are called *Bronze Wind Wands*. I like the idea of cast bronze sculptures being able to move in the wind.

I have drawings and sculptures in most public gallery collections in New Zealand. My work has been shown in Melbourne, Sydney, Brisbane, Singapore, Seoul, Tokyo, Kyoto, Los Angeles, New York, London, Seville, and The Hague.

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In the Wallace Arts Trust Collection

Sir James Wallace began collecting New Zealand art in the 1960s, with the collection now numbering over 7,500. It includes many emerging and mid-career artists, and has significant holdings of many other well-known artists. Nine of the ten exhibiting artists are represented in the Wallace Arts Trust Collection. The works represent a range of the artists' work, with the first work purchased in 1987 and a significant number purchased in the last five years.
